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MALABAR OUTREACH

In the previous *Malabar Mission Newsletter* we introduced our mission to Muslims, and the Wandoor and Malappuram stations that were set up for that work. In this issue we will outline our efforts in Calicut, the third South Malabar station started for work among Muslims, as well as the ministry of Rev. K. K. Alavi.

Calicut

Calicut, a port on the Arabian Sea, is the biggest city in Malabar. It is also a very old city. It has given its name to calico, a cotton cloth. Dr. Martin Luther mentioned Calicut, advising the German people not to spend too much money on its cloth! The spice trade was more important to Calicut than textiles, however, and it drew people from many nations, like flies to honey. Vasco da Gama of Portugal landed there May 20, 1498, introducing the European era, which brought so much sadness to the Malabar region. Today Calicut is a thriving commercial centre of a million people. On the other side of the Arabian Sea, which is really the northwest portion of the Indian Ocean, are the oil-rich Gulf States, and from them has come much money to Calicut. As a result, buildings are going up everywhere, the streets are thronged with people, and land prices are enormous. One-third of the residents of Calicut are Muslims. Called Mappilas, they were the first Muslims of India.

Christian work was first conducted in Calicut by the Basel Mission Society, which began in 1839. Their most famous missionary, Dr. B. Gundert, prepared the first Malayalam to English dictionary. As the result of its efforts, there is a congregation in Calicut with a large, attractive church. Anglicans followed when the British came, and Roman Catholics were there from Vasco da Gama's time. But their numbers are small, and no one was working among Muslims.

Exciting, first-hand reports from the Malabar Mission Circle (MMC) Gospel Workers in Kerala were given by Dr. Miller, who had returned from India just a week prior to the board meeting.

The journal which Dr. Miller kept during his seventeen days in India gives us a wonderful picture of his time there. We are informed of his encounters with each of the Gospel Workers: their joys, their sorrows, their accomplishments, and their requests.

Our India agent for fifteen years, **Rev. K. M. Victor** is now 74 years of age. He had agreed to serve as agent for one more year, with the hope our prayers to find a replacement for him would be answered. God willing, it looks like our prayers have been answered. On the last day of Dr. Miller's visit Rev. T. Joy, retiring president of Concordia Seminary in Nagercoil, travelled to Calicut to discuss the possibility of succeeding Rev. Victor. Discussions were positive, and these two men will work together for an agreed period of time, allowing Rev. Joy to become acquainted with the task, and Rev. Victor to become less involved and to serve more as a consultant. This was truly a day of great blessing!

he work of the Malabar
Mission Circle is most
certainly expanding. In the
Fall 2003 Malabar Mission
Newsletter, Dr. Miller informed us
about the work in Kannur, where the
Open Door student library and
reading room has been functioning
for about two years. St. Armands

Key Lutheran Church,
Sarasota, FL has pledged
to fully support the needs
of this project for the next
three years. Praise God,
from Whom all blessings
flow! Since cultural
restraints mean women
will not come to the Open
Door, a parallel program
is now being considered
to reach the young women
who attend a Government
Women's College just a
short distance away.

Medical work at the

Christian Welfare

Centre in Malappuram continues to be strong and effective. Four doctors serve there: Dr. Radha, the medical officer; her husband, Dr. Anand; Dr. Sophie Brillin, the gynecologist; and Dr. Annie Kutty. Although this institution is self-supporting, it is important to note help is always needed to provide special medicines such as antisnakebite serum, new equipment, and to enable more charitable work among the poor.

The hospital in Wandoor is presently working through some delicate issues regarding the retirement of Dr. Vijayan as its superintendent. We pray this matter will be quickly resolved so God's healing work, and our part in it, may continue. Funds were acknowledged for anti-snakebite serum.

'Though not the "original" policy of support for evangelism and service projects of the Malabar Mission Society (MMS), a two-year maintenance and repair project was agreed upon in 2002, and is

now completed. Because of this, many of the buildings in Malabar have been improved and refurbished, and their clean appearance enhances the image and witness of the church. All of the workers send their prayers and their thanks for the gifts and blessings through the MMS.

The ministry of **K. K. Alavi** was adopted by Faith Lutheran Church in Hutchinson, MN. In India Rev. Alavi receives program guidance from an excellent advisory committee, which met during Dr. Miller's visit. With additional support from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Elgin, IL, and other contributors, funding is available for a special literature project to put the CPH publication, "One Hundred Bible Stories," into Malayalam production. This work has beautiful coloured pictures. When first published in Kerala many years ago it was a winner, but funds have not been available to publish it again. This support from the Elgin congregation will translate into an 8,000-10,000 edition which will be used for both evangelism and nurture.

One can see why there is such keen interest in attending these board meetings when Dr. Miller has just returned from a visit to India. We get first-hand and close-up information about the progress in motion in Malabar!

he MMS Board met Friday and Saturday on the first weekend of several "weekend" blizzards experienced by Regina and area this winter. With many matters yet to be discussed, our meeting continued after a Friday-evening meal hosted by Luther College and the graciousness of Dr. Bryan Hillis. However, we were soon interrupted with the news that drifting snow was closing the parking lot and we had best finish our discussion for the evening and head for home if we wanted to get our vehicles out of the parking lot.

Since there would be no normal activity at the College on Saturday and we might not be able to get close to the buildings, it was determined we would resume our meeting on Saturday at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church. On Saturday morning my wonderful

hostess, Lorna Pederson, and I were astounded at the drifting that had taken place overnight, but managed to dig out of her driveway and get to the meeting, even if we were a bit late.

In 1969 the writer gathered a group of students and we conducted a Bible Correspondence Course campaign in the city; that group included our next India Agent, Rev. T. Joy. On the basis of our findings we decided to start work in Calicut, and Revs. Henry Otten and G. Vishwanathan, with their spouses, took it up.

The then Manitoba and Saskatchewan District of the Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod, led by Revs. Roy Holm and Ron Raedeke, gathered US\$35,000, and later the "Forward in Remembrance" campaign added US\$25,000, and with these funds we were able to purchase a property and construct the Good News Centre. It was completed in 1983, by the sterling efforts of Rev. P. Chellayen, as a three-story all-purpose building, with a separate pastor's residence. The compound is situated on a very busy road in a suburb called Meenchanda, which means "Fish-Market." The Centre is dedicated to the task of "catching" people, as Jesus commanded.

In the Good News Centre Rev. T. Joseph and Mrs. Joseph conduct an active nursery school on the first floor, with the second floor reserved as a worship centre and a Bible Correspondence Course centre. The top floor is used for rental purposes to gain income. Urban work, everywhere, is a challenging task.

Rev. Joseph has chosen to emphasize

prayer in his ministry, and he is very effective with this approach. Several miles from the Good News Centre he has an outreach station called Saradamandirum, where he goes regularly for prayer and where he has brought a Brahmin magician's family to faith. The Malabar Mission Society helps this work

with a monthly stipend, and in January assisted Rev. Joseph with motorcycle repairs. Rev. Joseph in a sense is both "fish" and "fisherman," for he is, himself, a Hindu convert from Wandoor, a product of our Malabar work.

The Ministry of K. K. Alavi

I have sometimes referred to Rev. K. K. Alavi as "the bravest Christian I have everknown." A convert from Islam, his stirring and widely-known testimony has thrilled many people. It is not possible to relate his personal story within the confines of this brief report. The story has been published under the title, "In Search of Assurance," and translated into 32 languages. Here we will speak only of his work in Calicut, which he calls "New Hope Mission."

Rev. Alavi's ministry in and beyond Calicut has two major prongs: the first is his personal outreach to Muslim people, and the second is his evangelistic literature program.

In terms of his personal witness, K.K. is famed for his courageous directness, for his boldness in the Lord. That is all the more remarkable because of his

perilous situation. There is a hymn line that says, "I walk in danger all the way." Despite the fact that he lives in that context he has an intrepid loyalty to Christ, and his courage has provided inspiration for other Muslims to follow him into the Christian faith. He numbers them at 47, but there are also thousands of inquirers.

That brings us to the second focus of his ministry—his outreach through literature. His evangelistic methodology is to write, translate, print, publish and distribute as much evangelistic literature as possible, which then leads to personal contact. For this purpose he works out of his home in Calicut, where he also spends a great deal of time in teaching and counselling new believers and serious enquirers.

After his graduation from Concordia Seminary in Nagercoil, K.K. worked for several years in Malabar in the service of the India Evangelical Lutheran Church. Following that he was in the employ of the Carmel Mission Society of Germany, situated at Manjeri, where he built up a major centre. In the past three years his ministry has been sponsored by Faith Lutheran Church in Hutchinson, Minnesota, collaborating with other congregations and working through the Malabar Mission Society. K.K.'s work is conducted on an independent basis, rather than within the frame of the Malabar Mission Circle, but maintaining personal contact with that work. His fine Advisory Committee is composed of senior Malabar laity, with Rev. Victor as its secretary.

Mrs. K. K. Alavi, whose name is Yasmin, is herself the daughter of Muslim converts. She has a very active and devoted ministry of hospitality, taking care of the literally hundreds of people who come to the Alavi home. The family has three grown children in educational institutions. In addition to the problems of security, both K.K. and Yasmin have

Introducing Dr. Hoefer

Dr. Herb Hoefer was born in Chicago, IL, in 1941. He was called from the seminary to be a missionary to India and served there for 15 years. He then served for 13 years as a pastor in River Falls, WI, and for the past 6 years as a Professor of Theology at Concordia University-Portland. He has his STM from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, and his doctorate from Columbia University, New York.

Along with teaching at Concordia-Portland, Dr. Hoefer has been serving part-time with the LCMS Board for Missions as Area Director for India and Sri Lanka. From January, Dr. Hoefer will take up new responsibilities with the LCMS Northwest District in mission development and expanded responsibilities with the LCMS Board for Missions, particularly in developing outreach to Muslims around the world. His writings have been primarily in the area of faith-culture issues in India.

Dr. Hoefer's wife is Carol (Cloeter) Hoefer. They have three daughters and one grandson. \P
