Rev. I. Titus and the Workers of the Malabar Mission Circle organized several events in 2017. **Vacation Bible School (VBS)** is a major outreach event that takes place every year in April or May. In 2017 VBS was held at 20 centres with a total of 609 children attending. There were 38 Muslim children, 327 Hindu children and 244 Christian children. The two largest VBS centres were Meenangadi with 97 children and St. John, Malappuram, with 94 children. Rev. A. T. Baby conducted VBS at eight different locations: Moolenkavu, Pulpalli, Odampalam, Pothukatty, Vizhayappatta, Naikkatty, Vattuvadi and Chooralmala. Rev. Joseph conducted one VBS at Sharada Mandiram. Pastor Raju conducted VBS at Cheriankolly as well as Mundakutty. Each of the remaining mission stations (Naduvil, Chengalai, Wandoor, Sharathkunnu, Pergamanna, Kalpetta and Kannur) also held VBS.

**Training for laymen** took place on June 6, 2017 at Malappuram. Unfortunately, the Marxist party also planned some activity on that day, which interfered with bus transportation. As a result attendance was lower than expected. The 25 people who attended included 18 laymen, four pastors, two officers and one guest. The guest speaker, Rev. Dr. Rajendrababu, former principal of Concordia Seminary in Nagercoil, gave two presentations, while Rev. Titus gave one presentation. Rev. Rejidas conducted the opening service and Pastor Bennet led in closing prayer.

The **Ladies' Seminar** was held at House of Hope in Meenangadi with five pastors and 27 women in attendance. Rev. Titus and Mrs. Shana Sam (wife of Dr. Sam, both of Concordia Seminary in Nagercoil), each presented on "The Role of Women to Spread the Gospel Inside and Outside the Church." The Seminar closed with prayer by Rev. Rejidas and benediction by Rev. Titus.

The **Youth Camp** met Sept. 29-30 with 49 youth from MMC congregations in attendance. Guest presenters were Mr. Shan Soman and Mr. Praveen. First and second prizes were awarded to the winners of the Bible Quiz conducted by Rev. Rasalayyan. Pastor Bennet closed the seminar with prayer and benediction. The seminar was a great success and very well received.

The **Family Convention** was held Oct. 27-28 with 142 people registered. Fifty-six people came from Mundakutty. A couple from Vadattupara traveled ten hours by bus to attend the convention. Food for four meals was prepared by male cooks in an outdoor kitchen. The theme of the convention was the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation, with II Corinthians 5 as the Scripture passage. Brother Prathap Johnson Joseph from Mission India Calicut gave three dynamic presentations. In addition, Rev. Titus conducted a Bible study, Rev. Rejidas gave a presentation on Martin Luther, and Rev. Joseph led the Bible Quiz. A band and singing group on stage provided music. A communion service took place at 8 a.m. on Saturday, with Rev. Oliver as liturgist and Pastor Suseelan as preacher. The closing noon meal was shared by 172 people.

### **PENKUTTY, A SYMBOL OF FAITH AND HOPE**

Penkuty, a young woman from Malappuram, was a member of a poor Hindu family of coconut-tree tappers. Although in her early thirties, she was still living at home. She had been married, but as was common in her community, had been deserted by her husband for failing to have children. Her mother had died and she was living with her father and two brothers. Her future seemed bleak. A friend recommended her to us as a good person to help us in our home as an *ayah*, i.e. nursemaid, for our two small children. We hired her in 1958 and she soon became a valuable member of our household, happy to escape the drudgery of her home life. We found her to be a loving and hardworking person. After we returned from our 1959 furlough we re-employed her to help out with number three, our newborn Betsy.

One morning in 1961 she appeared at our home weeping and in a sad state, badly bruised and barely walking. The previous day, without having mentioned her feelings to us, she had informed her family that she wanted to become a Christian. When asked why, she told them it was because she had found love in our home. Her two brothers became very angry and beat her. Mary Helen nursed her in our home for four days before she recovered enough to return to her family. Roland went to her place and had a talk with her father requesting that there be no more beating. Her father not only gave his word that would not happen again, but reluctantly agreed that she be allowed to study the Christian faith.

In the course of time we went to the hill station at Kodaikanal for our annual vacation. Penkuty went with us. There she met a Christian widower named Francis, who worked in the home of our fellow missionaries, Herbert and Dorothy Zorn. They lived in the neighbouring state of Tamil Nad. Francis was smitten with Penkuty and asked for permission to marry her. Penkuty was thrilled and wished to marry him, even though it meant she would be living far from home and in a different language area. She informed her family of her decision by mail. Once again her brothers became outraged and made all sorts of threats to her and serious charges against us, accusing us of kidnapping her. For Penkuty's protection we had to inform the police. In the end Roland went to Malappuram to discuss the matter with her father. His attitude was different, and he was the final authority. He came back to Kodaikanal with Roland to meet Francis and to discuss the proposal. Penkuty was able to convince him that this was indeed her decision and he gave his permission. All was well and her father even returned the next month to attend Penkuty's baptism on a Friday and her wedding the next day. There was much rejoicing.

Penkuty went with Francis to his home in Nagercoil, at the tip of India. She led a happy life there as a member of a loving Christian family and church community. When she died in the late 70s, her grieving husband wrote a beautiful letter saying how much they had cared for each other.


Penkuty was a symbol of faith. Christ's love broke in on her, and she glowed. She was a symbol of hope for us as the first fruit of our witness in Malappuram. She loved the Lord deeply and made her witness courageously. Later others followed, but the first person holds a special, memorable place.

Jesus stated two fundamental things about His light. He said, "I am the light of the world" and "You are the light of the world." The Malabar

The **Open Door**, a reading room for men, continues to function with Mr. Jeyarajan as worker.

The **Friendship Centre in Malappuram**, with Mr. John Tennyson in charge, continues to provide reading material for many people each month thanks to its good location and reputation. Subscriptions for six newspapers and 24 periodicals are sponsored from outside. In August 2017, 12 volumes of the Islamic Encyclopedia worth Rs 28,800, and 40 Malayalam novels and general knowledge books were donated to the library, thanks to Dr. Ashraf of Dubai and Muhammad Shai of West Kodur.
